

Hailed by The Washington Post as "Sweetly Lyrical," violinist, composer/songwriter, and community organizer **Ariel Horowitz** cannot remember life before loving music. In 2020, Ariel joined the Concert Artists Guild roster for North American management, and enjoys an active touring schedule as a soloist and as one-half of Vision Duo, an ensemble formed with fellow CAG artist Britton-René Collins in 2021. As a composer, songwriter, and avid improviser, Ariel's original music centers themes of healing, community, and liberation. They have performed their compositions and songs around the world, including at Carnegie Hall and the Kennedy Center.



Praised for her "colorful, flexible and expressive playing" (Res Musica), pianist **Alexa Stier** has performed extensively across Europe, the United States and South America. Alexa is a top prizewinner of the Olivier Messiaen International Piano Competition and the Virtuoso e Belcanto Concerto Competition, and a laureate of the Orléans International Piano Competition and the George Enescu International Piano Competition. Alexa's most notable appearances include solo recitals and chamber music collaborations at Lincoln Center (New York City), Merkin Hall (New York City), the Liszt Cultural Institute (New York City), Dame Myra Hess Memorial Concerts (Chicago), Glasgow Royal Concert Hall (U.K.) and Palazzo Pfanner (Lucca, Italy).



Shauna M Smith graduated Magna Cum Laude from the College of Idaho with three diplomas: violin performance, philosophy, and visual art. She then went on to earn her Master of Art and an Artist's Diploma in violin/viola performance from the Aaron Copland School of Music, City University of New York where she studied with Burton Kaplan and Daniel Phillips. Ms. Smith has played section and principle violin and viola with the Anchorage Symphony Orchestra, Spokane Symphony, Boise Philharmonic, the New York City Nova Philharmonic, and Las Vegas Symphony.



Sergei Vassiliev is the founder of Educational Partnerships Immersive Concerts (EPIC). Since 2009, Vassiliev has served as principal clarinetist of the Colorado Springs Philharmonic. He performs actively across the U.S. and Europe as a soloist, chamber musician, and clinician. He has held principal clarinet positions with the Des Moines Metro Opera Orchestra and Boise Philharmonic, and appeared as guest principal with Music in the Mountains. He has also performed with the Houston Symphony, Colorado Symphony, and most recently, the Los Angeles Philharmonic under Gustavo Dudamel at Walt Disney Concert Hall and under Thomas Søndergård at the Hollywood Bowl. In 2019, he was featured as both artistic director and soloist in the Colorado Springs Philharmonic's Signature Series.
